WELCOME TO OUR HISTORIC AND EXCITING PROJECT!

The 150th Year Anniversary of the hiring of the first team of Chinese Railroad Workers that worked on the Transcontinental Railroad came in 2015. Their endurance made it possible for a young nation to undergo the drastic economic transformation that occurred when the West was connected to the eastern United States for the first time by rail. Although the majority of the labor force on the West side was from China, the Chinese workers were really not acknowledged for their hard work and losses. Not until May 2014, the U.S. Department of Labor finally honored the workers by inducting them into their Wall of Fame. http://vimeo.com/103276444

In Northern California, the Chinese Railroad Workers has nothing in the Sierra Mountains to memorialize or pay tribute to those who survived or perished in those harsh conditions. Finally after 144 years, the Placer County Historical Society placed a brief descriptive plaque on a rock in Gold Run, at the first rest stop traveling east on Interstate 80 to Reno, Nevada. This plaque is the closet marker to the rails that commemorates the sacrifice of the Chinese workers. With the 2015 Celebration happening this year, major events are being planned in Sacramento and San Francisco California. With a very aggressive timeline, our goal is to highlight the new Chinese Railroad Workers Memorial Monument with a scaled mockup design of the full size monument in November 2015. The final scaled down version will hopefully be permanently placed at a public location in San Francisco. The following years it is our hope to get the full version at the Gold Run rest stop. Ribbon Cutting Ceremony will be planned with community and family organizations, as well as local, state and federal dignitaries.

CHINESE RAILROAD WORKER MEMORIAL MONUMENT PROJECT

Between 1865 and 1869, about 15 thousands of Chinese migrants toiled at a grueling pace and in perilous working conditions to help construct America's First Transcontinental Railroad. The Chinese Railroad Workers Memorial Monument Project seeks to give a recognized solemn tribute to the Chinese migrants who lost their lives laboring on the Transcontinental Railroad, which shape the physical and social landscape of the American West.

In 1865, Charles Crocker needed thousands of workers to begin work on the Central Pacific Railroad portion of the construction of the first transcontinental line in North America in order to meet a Congressional time mandate. He proceeded to recruit workers in South China who took part in the construction project that culminated in 1869 with Leland Stanford driving in the famous "golden spike" to complete the line. This Project's goal is to bring greater national recognition and tribute to the Chinese workers who played an absolutely central role in building the infrastructure that linked the East Coast to the West Coast of the U.S.

The Chinese Railroad Workers are one of a few pioneers that do not have any significant monument that pays tribute to their work and lives lost while working in the harsh Sierra's mountain ranges.

Located at a rest stop off Interstate 80, at Dutch Flats, near Gold Run, the Placer County Historical Society placed a marker where the Chinese workers first started working on the Transcontinental Railroad. With the full support of the PCHS, our new Monument will replace the large rock, that the

ARTIST SEARCH

Funding was approved 2/24/2014 based on the proposal below.

The Chinese Historical Society [OF AMERICA] in San Francisco will be the project fiscal agent.

CRRW MEMORIAL MONUMENT Project Budget = \$300K - \$400 K

Starter Loan Fund = \$15K

Funding for the Artist search has already been graciously advanced by a notable non-profit organization. The budget will be used to cover the costs for a Project Administrator who will research, organize and prequalify the Artist outreach. Selected artists will be asked to submit portfolios that will be submitted to a selection of qualified community panelists before an assigned deadline. The panel will then score each of the artists 1- 10 (1=low score) on the following criteria:

- Artistic Excellence
- Appropriateness of the artist's work for the site
- Their knowledge of the Chinese Railroad Workers history
- Past experience using the raw material necessary that will withstand the harsh elements of the site location.

Voting will yield two artist finalists that will be given a budget of \$4,000 each to create a 2 or 3D artwork their visions for final selection by the Executive Task Force and the Art Selection Committee

I am writing to personally invite you to enter the open call for art submissions for the Chinese Railroad Workers Memorial Project. I cannot tell you how I'm delighted to be involved regarding this once in a lifetime opportunity for you.

During the 1860's, it's estimated about 1,200 Chinese died while building the Transcontinental Railroad through the treacherous Sierra Nevada's. The year 2015 will mark the 150th year since the Chinese were first to be hired to help finish this monumental task. The location has been sited to be at Dutch Flat, immediately off a major roadway in California's Gold Country. The monument will be have proper signage and will have an area to view the lasting permanent monument for all to learn and see and to withstand the harsh winters these workers endured.

To commemorate this feat we will have a permanent monument to honor these sojourners. The diverse committee of entities such as the Chinese Historical Society of America, Chinese Six Companies, Organization of Chinese Americans (National), philanthropists, Caltrans, and as well as many others will commit to raise \$300,000 for the entire project.

Our judges will be a select panel with deep knowledge of arts, culture and sculpture experts. Much has been written, in books, photographed, in films, in theatre, but never permanent monument to commemorate them. By creating this monument, this assures that these Chinese workers will be remembered for generations to come, and indeed forever, with this will enrich the history of Chinese Americans and an overlooked untold story of Americas in that important era in the building of this country.

The Chinese Rail Road Memorial Project [CRRWMP] is inviting you to submit a proposal for a sculptural monument that will be erected in honor of the Chinese railroad workers that served and died during the construction of our nation's first transcontinental railroad system. Between 1865 and 1869, thousands of Chinese migrants worked in perilous conditions in the harsh sierra mountain ranges in order to complete the railroad and many lost their lives. The Chinese Railroad Workers Memorial Monument Project seeks to recognize the important historic contribution and stand as a solemn tribute to the Chinese migrants who lost their lives laboring on the Transcontinental Railroad, which shaped the physical and social landscape of the American West.




SELECTION CRITERIA

- •Complete application form and submitted prior to September 30th 2014.
- •Submit artwork examples that represent the artist's own original creative work.
- •The artist's work is judged to be appropriate to the goals of the project.
- •The artist's professional experience is adequate to meet the demands of the project. Qualifying activities would include some combination of the following: education and training as an artist, an exhibition record in museums, commercial art galleries, and/or non-profit art spaces, previous public or private commissions; participation in artist-inresidency programs, or other related activities indicative of a professional art practice.
- ·Assessed ability to meet project deadlines and to perform work in a timely and professional manner.
- •All applying artist should know the history of the Transcontinental Railroad and the importance of this memorial to the Chinese and to American history.
- •The artist's work should reflect artistic excellence, innovation and originality, as evidenced by professional quality of craftsmanship and mastery of skills, techniques; professional approaches to processes and presentation, and/or communicate a unique vision or perspective.
- •This memorial must last the test of time against the natural Sierra's hash environment. Bronze, steel, granite, or concrete are suggested. Any material that cannot withstand extreme cold or snow or will not last for 100 years will not be considered.

*Please be aware that there are no guidelines for the style of this project. We are open to all styles of sculpture ranging from traditional bronze to contemporary design. Above all else, we are going to bring a crtifical eye to design, context and durability. It is very important that your design should NOT be constructed out of a non-perishable material such as plastic, wood, plaster, glass,etc.
